The Seder Plate and Other Items on the Table

- **Parsley** (*karpas*) symbolizes spring and rebirth
- *Haroset* a mixture of chopped apples, nuts, grape juice and spices. Symbolizes the mortar that was used to cement the bricks in Egypt
- Bitter herbs (maror) bitter herbs, horseradish or romaine lettuce
- **Egg** (beytzah) symbolizes the sacrifice that was made in the Temple times at this festival
- **Roasted lamb shank** bone symbolizing the Passover sacrifice in Temple times.
- **Salt Water** symbolizes the tears we cry from living in slavery.
- **Matzah** the bread we eat that had no time to rise because we had to leave Egypt, *Mitzrayim* the "narrow" place so quickly.

[We were slaves, You made us free!]

Wine/Grape Juice

Baruch atah Adonai, Eloheinu Melech H'Olam, boray pri ha gaffen.

Blessed are You, Eternal One our G!d, (or "Spirit of the World"), who created the fruit of the vine.

Drink some wine or grape juice.

Karpas - Dipping the Parsley

Baruch atah Adonai, Eloheinu Melech H'Olam, boray pri ha'adamah.

Blessed are You, Eternal One our G!d, (or "Spirit of the World"), who created the fruit of the earth.

Eat a bit of parsley, which you can also dip into the salt water representing the tears we shed for those oppressed.

Blessing for the Maror - Bitter Herbs

Baruch Atah Adonai Eloheinu Melech H'Olam, asher kideshanu bemitzvotav vetzivanu al ahilat maror.

Blessed are You, Eternal One our G!d, (or "Spirit of the World"), who makes us holy with our connection to You and instructs us to eat *maror*.

Put a little bit of the maror on some matzah and eat.

Blessing for the Matzah

Baruch Atah Adonai Eloheinu Melech H'Olam, ha'motzi lechem min ha'aretz.

Blessed are You, Eternal One our G!d, (or "Spirit of the World"), who brings bread forth from the earth.

Eat a piece of matzah.

The Afikomen

We take the matzah and break the middle piece on our plate in half. We wrap that in a napkin and hold it until the end of the meal when we will eat it. We take the other half and wrap it in a napkin to be hidden and hopefully

found, before we leave today.

No prayer is recited before we break the middle matzah on the seder plate. This is a silent act. We realize that, like the broken matzah, we are all incomplete, with prayers yet to be fulfilled, promises still to be redeemed.

We hide part of this broken matzah and hope it will be found by the end of our seder meal, for we recognize that parts of ourselves are yet unknown. We are still discovering what makes us whole.

We hide the larger of the two parts of the middle matzah because we know that more is hidden than is revealed. With the generations that have come before us and with one another, our search begins.

Magid - Telling the Story

As we recite each of the plagues together, we dip a finger into the juice in our cups and dot a drop onto our plates, imagining the plague in the form of the drop:

Blood Frogs Lice Beasts Cattle
Plague Boils Hail Locusts Darkness
Death of the Firstborn

Now put some maror and some horseradish on a piece of matzah and cover with another piece of matzah and eat. We call this the "Hillel sandwich" after our Sage who, when asked how to learn all of Torah while standing on one leg replied "Do unto others as you would have done unto you. The rest is commentary. Go and learn."
